IDENTITY

Wycliffe Hall is a centre of excellence for theological study and research, where students are encouraged to grow together both academically and spiritually. At Wycliffe, we firmly believe that our studies are not just academic but a crucial foundation for our faith and vocation, whatever that may be.

Wycliffe was established in 1877 as an evangelical ministerial college at the heart of Oxford—an identity that continues to this day as a Permanent Private Hall of the University. Training men and women for Anglican ordination remains an important focus. However, Wycliffe welcomes students

from a rich diversity of backgrounds, studying a variety of degrees, and with different trajectories for their lives, and is home to a large and dynamic graduate community.




From Michaelmas 2022 Wycliffe will be working with the Lanier Foundation UK to establish a graduate centre at Yarnton Manor, a Jacobean Manor 4 miles north of Oxford, providing further opportunities for additional accommodation, research, and social space.











UNIVERSITY

Wycliffe welcomes students studying at all graduate levels through the University of Oxford. The central aim of graduate programmes at Oxford is to encourage and empower each student to develop their own thoughts and research alongside world-leading academics. Each course will combine elements of teaching with personal research, and core contact will be through seminars or individual supervision, where students read, research, and present their own ideas to their peers and supervisors.

Academic environment

In addition to formal sessions, graduates at Oxford also learn through the plethora of other opportunities that the University provides to meet with one another. At Oxford, graduates are invited to contribute to ongoing conversations and debates. Although the terms are short, it is an immersive experience where students learn, develop, and thrive through their own research and collaboration with others.


Support

Studying at Oxford is inspiring yet intensive. In addition to the academic and spiritual support provided by the Wycliffe team and community, graduates also receive access to faculty and Bodleian libraries, and a host of historic and modern places and spaces to work. Churches and Christian groups across the city, as well as student societies also take an active interest in student welfare. They can introduce you to a plethora of sporting, cultural, and social facilities as well as local churches and support services.









ORDINATION

As an evangelical seminary at the heart of the University of Oxford, Wycliffe offers a vibrant community for graduate ordinands. Training for ordination at Wycliffe offers students the ability to make use of Wycliffe's considerable ministerial and spiritual training resources and experience, but also to immerse themselves in the academic life of the University as they develop their theological education and research.

Integration

Ordinands at Wycliffe are able to be trained in ministry while studying alongside theologians from around the University under the guidance of some of the world's leading scholars. Here they will be given the opportunity to broaden their knowledge, be challenged on their presuppositions, and to develop their own research in a rigorous and enriching environment. At Wycliffe we will ensure that your

academic study and ministerial development are thoroughly integrated so that they never stand in tension but remain a coherent pathway towards your individual vocation and ministry, whatever that may be.

Tailored Pathways

At Wycliffe, we recognize that no two vocations are alike, and strive to ensure that each student develops in every way possible for their calling. For those investigating pastoral ministry, the MTh offers students the opportunity to develop their prior theological

learning and to focus their research on its application. At Wycliffe you will be encouraged to develop resources for your future ministry, and for how the church may continue to impact the world around it.

For those whose vocation is as a 'potential theological educator', the University of Oxford offers some of the most prestigious research degrees. At Wycliffe ordinands are trained by academics researching at the highest levels in their own fields, who understand the importance of academic theology for the church and wider community. At Wycliffe you will be nurtured and encouraged in your academic development and ministry, and offered training to be effective ministers and communicators.

Embracing a diversity of worship at Wycliffe. and liturgical styles, our aim is that students will feel at home, but also expand their horizons as we worship together in this rich community.


Fellowship Groups

Fellowship groups offer students the opportunity to gather in a smaller group setting, to develop closer relationships, and to share

and encourage one another in their intellectual and spiritual journey. Groups meet weekly for prayer, bible study, and discussion, and work together to lead services in the college chapel. Groups are led by a tutor who oversees the spiritual, emotional, and intellectual formation of each student, and acts as an advisor during their time





All graduate courses are run through their respective faculties and departments. Students wishing to apply for these courses will need to do so through Oxford's centralised Graduate Admissions department. Please go to www.ox.ac.uk/admissions/graduate for further information.

Individual graduate courses will have their own entry requirements. However, most will require applicants have achieved a good 2:1 (67% or 3.8 GPA) in a previous degree, and request transcripts, references, a personal statement, and a sample of written work. Degrees with a considerable research element (the DPhil and, to a lesser extent, the MPhil) will require a research proposal as well.

Potential applicants should consult the Graduate Admissions pages for further details of what their applications may require. However, applicants are also encouraged to contact Wycliffe in advance for further guidance and advice on how to apply.

The application form will ask potential students to indicate a first-choice college that they would like to attend. If you would like to come to Wycliffe, please enter our name on your application form. If for some reason Wycliffe does not appear to be allocated to your chosen course, please contact the Hall for advice.

Applications will first be considered by the relevant faculties who will formally admit students onto their courses. Once this has been done, applications are then sent to the respective colleges who review and accept students for membership.

Ordinands


In addition to the application onto their chosen course, prospective ordinands will also need to apply directly to Wycliffe for their ordination training.

This can be done directly through the central Wycliffe Hall website.
